3. Membership in AFICS - T

The AFICS-T membership has grown steadily since the founding meeting, held on 26 February 2001, when there were only 87 participants. Number of membership by year (including non paid-up members) is shown below:

As of 30 April 2015, the paid-up membership stands at 720. However, the total number of members, including those with membership fees in arrears, was 787. Since the introduction of the life membership in 2008, the Association now has 423 life members. It has 60 members who are 80 years old or over, and are exempted from annual membership fees.

4. Summary of Activities

The Executive Board is pleased to provide the following summary of activities and assistance to members, which were carried out on behalf of the Association during the period under review, details of which are reflected in the reports of the respective Committees below.

4.1 Summary of Financial Report

Ms. Panvipa Thammakoranonta, Auditor, will audit all accounts of AFICS-T. The audited financial statement of accounts for the period from 1 July 2014 to 30 June 2015 will be distributed at the Fifteenth Annual General Assembly.

4.2 Report on Memberships in FAFICS

As members may be aware, the Association sought membership in the Federation of the Associations of Former International Civil Servants (FAFICS) in 2001, and was accepted in July of that year. Since then, AFICS-Thailand has been paying membership dues to FAFICS, on the basis of number of subscribing members as of 1st January of each year. However, considering the capacity of payment of small AFICS, beginning 2014 FAFICS has fixed the contribution rate at US\$1.50 per member per year.

4.3 Report of the Committee on Pension and Group Life Insurance Benefits

Based on the movement of the Thailand Consumer Price Index (CPI), pension benefits of beneficiaries on the local currency (Baht) track were adjusted upward by 2.3%, effective from 1 April 2015. The Executive Board had spotted a typing mistake of the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD) in that the Thailand All Commodities Index (December 2014) was given to the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund (UNJSPF) as 106.00 instead of 106.65. The Executive Board wrote to both the UNSD and UNJSPF for the correction before the official announcement. Consequently, the increase in CPI (2.3%) surpassed the threshold of 2% set by the UNJSPF, resulting in the upward pension benefit adjustment. For pensioners who separated from services in 2014 or early 2015, the benefit increase would be prorated. The pension benefits for beneficiaries on the United States Dollar track remained the same, as the CPI increase was not up to 2%.

As reported to the Annual General Assembly last year, the Executive Board would like to advise that the UNJSPF was still in the course of implementing a new Integrated Pension Administration System (IPAS). As per advice from the UNJSPF secretariat, in May 2015, the UNJSPF staff members were engaged in extensive training for the final preparations in moving to the IPAS. During the transition period and with the continued website operation, there was no negative impact on the participants, retirees or other beneficiaries. UNJSPF hoped that, when in full operation, the IPAS would increase the capacity to accommodate the large number of participants, retirees and other beneficiaries. It would further strengthen the Fund's internal control, risk management and provide clients with the "self-service" capabilities. The Board would follow up on the issue and keep members of AFICS-T informed of any further development.

As members of AFICS-T may know, a revised Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the UNJSPF and the UN Office of Human Resources Management (OHRM) was being developed on basis of the decisions of the Pension Board in July 2014 with the endorsement of the General Assembly at its 69th session. Some staff and retirees raised their objection to the MOU revision and solicited e-signatures in a petition letter to be sent to the Secretary-General of the United Nations as they considered that the CEO of the Pension Fund would be given too much authority in the administration and management of the Fund. On the other hand, the CEO in his open letters to pension participants, retirees and beneficiaries, pointed out that the allegations were unsubstantiated. They were just harmful rumours. Meanwhile, the Federation of Associations of Former International Civil Servants (FAFICS), our parent association, in its letter of 8 May 2015 to members, gave the background information of the MOU amendment. Following the proper procedures with the involvement of different concerned UN offices including the Office of Legal Affairs (OLA), FAFICS assured that it has found nothing in the proposed updated MOU that supports unsubstantiated claims put forward in the petition letter. The Executive Board would keep an eye on this issue and inform members of the subsequent development in due course.

Some time ago, the ESCAP Human Resources Management Section (HRMS) advised us that for ownership of the official papers issued by authorities in language other than English which would need to be submitted to the UN office, the English translation should be done by the retirees, and witnessed by a responsible staff in HRMS. In this regard, the HRMS was helpful enough to provide some English templates of some important papers, such as birth certificate, death certificate, marriage certificate and ID card, etc., to facilitate the translation into English. These templates were available in AFICS-T office and could be given to members on request. Furthermore, two staff members in HRMS, namely, Khun Pasima Kanchanamongkol and Khun

Cheeranat Pongpanarat, had been trained and assigned, among their other duties, to help retirees, if needed.

The Executive Board participated in the Pre-Retirement Planning Seminar, organized by the ESCAP HRMS on 12 November 2014. Members of the Executive Board gave presentation on related issues regarding retirement experience-sharing and AFICS-T services to its members. In a follow-up evaluation regarding “mode of delivery”, “knowledge/information gained” and “impact to job/or personal life”, conducted by HRMS, participants expressed high satisfaction on our presentation. The Executive Board made some suggestions/changes to the HRMS for its consideration in conducting this year’s programme.

The Executive Board recently organized an excursion-cum-seminar in Nakhon Nayok on 26-27 April 2015. Members of AFICS-T including some spouses enthusiastically participated in this activity. In the seminar, participants were briefed of information on pension and other benefits, much to their satisfaction.

A team of three UNFCU members, led by Mr. Timothy Challen, Business Development Manager, Geneva, visited Bangkok on 20 and 21 October 2014. The Executive Board held a meeting with the visitors on 20 October 2014. The UNFCU decided to make Bangkok the hub of its operation in Asia. As such, UNFCU representatives would regularly visit Bangkok. We again expressed our concern in the communication difficulty, which the UNFCU would endeavour to solve, mainly involving the Thai translation of papers. Some account holders also faced some problems/delays in the member-to-member electronic transfer, the timely delivery of cheque-books, the possible fraudulent use of UNFCU visa card, and the prompt release of a deceased member’s account for use by the spouse. UNFCU took note of the points and would try to solve the problems and provide quality services.

As usual, the Executive Board helped the members of AFICS-T in collecting the signed 2014 Certificates of Entitlement (CEs) and returned them to the UNJSPF, which later acknowledged the receipt. Members could check in the website of UNJSPF of the receipt status of their CEs. Upon the UNJSPF’s notification of non-receipt of the signed CEs from pensioners living in Thailand and those who had worked in the UN system in Thailand prior to their retirement, irrespective whether they are members of AFICS-T or not, the Executive Board would try ways and means in contacting them and report back to the UNJSPF accordingly, so as to avoid benefit payment suspension.

The Executive Board continued in providing assistance to pensioners and their spouses in drafting e-mail messages or letters to UNJSPF, regarding their periodic benefits, disabled child benefits, spouse benefit, two-track pension adjustment system, change of mailing address and bank accounts for pension deposit, transfer of funds, birth certificates of spouses, etc.

Upon request, the Executive Board assisted spouses of the deceased members in approaching HRMS for the preparing and forwarding of the necessary documents to UNJSPF for the processing and conversion from “pension benefit” to “spouse benefit”, as well as group life insurance reimbursement. In this regard, pensioners are requested to check that their personal files kept by the HRMS contained updated information. Further, it is important that the retiree number (R/.....), which serve as the ID of retiree and is not confidential, should better be made known to their spouses and family members as well as the AFICS-T office, for ease and facilitation in dealing with UNJSPF.

The Executive Board would like to alert members who are eligible participants of the After Service Life Insurance (ASLI) and are interested to have confirmation on their eligibility and if desired to update their formerly designated beneficiaries by filling out a new Designation of Beneficiary Form. In this regard, it should be noted that the procedures of the UN Group Life Insurance require that matters and documentation regarding Group Life Insurance are to be handled by the human resources staff of the respective UN offices from where the retirees had separated their services.

4.4 Report of the Committee on Medical Benefits

4.4.1 UN International Plan (former Vanbreda International Plan)

In SEC/DIR/7/Rev.8, it was officially announced that with effect from 1 February 2015, Vanbreda International was rebranded to Cigna. As a result, Vanbreda International changed its name to Cigna as of 1 February 2015. The new name represented the same company, i.e. Vanbreda International, its services and its team.

In connection with the rebranding, a team of three members of Vanbreda International, led by Mr. Paul Debrabandere, Deputy Director, IGO Health Benefits visited Bangkok and held a meeting with the Executive Board members on 25 November 2014. In fact, Vanbreda International had been absorbed by Cigna since 2010. It was assured that the same good quality and types of services would be maintained and even expanded to make full use of the IT. For instance, a pilot project had been initiated to allow members to submit on-line their claims, and the possibility to install an “App” on smart phones for direct access to the website of the company.

In the meeting, the Executive Board, noting that there was neither change in the reimbursement rules nor the entitlements, raised issues relating to the ceiling reimbursement entitlements of dental treatment, optical lenses and single room accommodation in hospital, which had remained the same for many years. The Executive Board recommended that consideration be given to increase the limit. We also informed the visitors of our visits to several hospitals in Bangkok, such as Phyathai One, Vichaiyut, Siriraj Piyamaharajkarun and Chaophaya, for negotiation in discounts and benefits for AFICS-T members.

4.4.2 Medical Insurance Plan (MIP)

The United Nations Insurance and Disbursement Service (IDS) announced officially that Vanbreda International (now rebranded as Cigna) had been selected as a new third party administrator for the MIP and would take over the processing of health insurance claims, issuance of letters of payment guarantees and the provision of other administrative services related to the MIP, effective 1 April 2015, while the policy governing the MIP should remain unchanged.

In connection with the change and for the inconvenience and difficulties experienced by some MIP members consisting of active staff members and retirees during the transition period, the ESCAP HRMS invited the representatives of Cigna, the new third party administrator, to come to Bangkok for consultation/discussion. Consequently, Ms. Sook Kuan Leong and Ms. Preeyanut Wutthi-in, Cigna representatives in Kuala Lumpur office, visited Bangkok on 4 and 5 May 2015. The representatives made a presentation of Cigna medical network services, its administration and processing of medical claims in a town-hall meeting held on 4 May 2015. Afterwards they provided individual consultations to MIP members.

In a separate meeting with the representatives on 5 May 2015, AFICS-T Executive Board members brought to the attention of the representatives issues compiled from the input of AFICS-T members, such as the delay in the processing of medical claims, the subsequent late receipt of payment from the Cigna Belgian office, the bank charge of 100 Baht, the decision on the reimbursables and non-reimbursables vis-a-vis the practice of the former third party administrator in Singapore, the simplification of the claim form and its availability in Thai, the inclusion of more medical care providers in the network for direct payment arrangements, the non-receipt by some members of new membership cards which served as identification and direct payment settlement card, etc. The representatives took note of the issues and would keep us informed of any further development. The Cigna representatives would visit Bangkok in September 2015 when we would follow up the issues with them.

The IDS issued a memorandum on 28 April 2015 regarding the newly issued administrative instruction and information circular for the MIP for locally recruited staff members at designated duty stations outside of Headquarters. It covered the following benefit improvements:

- (a) The overall maximum equals 6 times the MIP reference salary per individual persons in a single year, i.e. Baht 1,230,150.00 or equivalent to US\$37,323.00 per annum.
- (b) Doctor's fees involving hospitalization/in-patient care will now be reimbursed at 100 per cent from the previous 80 per cent.
- (c) Annual physical examinations will be covered at 80 per cent. Cigna will later provide the list of exams considered for routine physical examination.
- (d) Yearly eye examinations will be covered at 80 per cent up to a limit of US\$100.00 in a period of 12 months.
- (e) Lenses will be covered at US\$75.00/lens, with a maximum of two lenses in a period of 12 months.
- (f) Frames will be covered at US\$50.00 per frame in a period of 24 months.
- (g) Chemotherapy and radiation treatments received outside of hospitals are covered at 100 per cent.
- (h) The stop-loss limits have been changed as follows:
 - Active staff: 50 per cent of the staff member's monthly net base salary.
 - Retirees: 25 per cent of the monthly net base salary at the date of separation adjusted by the global cost-of-living increases declared by the United Nations Joint Staff Pension fund.

With the above benefit improvements, the contribution rates (insurance premium) by both staff members/retirees and their respective organizations will increase by about 5 per cent effective 1 September 2015, as indicated in the following table:

Members should note that the above-cited "benefit improvements" and "premium increase" refer only to MIP members of ESCAP staff and retirees. MIP members of other UN offices and agencies are advised to contact their respective administrative offices for the details. It is expected that information circulars will be issued by the respective authorities in due course.

On the basis of the above developments and making use of the existing AFICS-T members LINE group on MIP, the Executive Board has adopted a strategy to better service its members and the Committee on Medical Benefits identified several issues to be addressed including communication with Cigna and collaboration with staff representative bodies of ESCAP, UNDP and UNICEF.

4.5 Report of the Committee on Information

The Committee regularly updated the database of the Association's memberships and provided information support to other Committees in this regard.

At the 14th Annual General Assembly, a new AFICS-T website was launched and could be accessed through internet at www.aficsthailand.in.th. The newly designed website particularly features a Q&A section in bilingual languages (English and Thai). Since then, the new AFICS-T website underwent continuous adjustments, especially updating the background information page. However, more maintenance work needs to be carried out. The *ad hoc* Working Group on Web Management of AFICS-T is currently devising a plan of action to make the AFICS-T website more informative.

4.6 Report of the Committee on Publicity and Newsletters

AFICS-T issued, on a regular basis, a number of "Circulars/Newsletters" with a view to keeping members informed about issues and activities that would be of concern and interest to them. The Board accordingly issued the following circulars during the period under review:

4.8 Report of the Committee on Recreation and Tours

During the reporting period, the Committee organized 3 trips, as follows:

1. Trip to the Northeast of Thailand (Ubonrachathani Province) and Southern Laos (Paksae) from 26-30 January 2015 for 5 days and 4 nights;
2. An Excursion-cum-Seminar trip to Nakhon Nayok Province from 26-27 April 2015 for 2 days and 1 night. There were 93 people attending this seminar.
3. Trip to Taiwan from 6-12 May 2015 for 7 days and 6 nights.

The Committee is pleased to report that it received very encouraging and positive feedback from participating members to the programmes.

4.9 Report of the Committee on Foreigners Living in Thailand (FLIT)

As in previous years the Committee has assisted active and retired UN staff inside and outside of Thailand regarding retirement in the country. This included consultations in person or by phone and email on:

- Initial application procedures for new retirees,
- Annual renewal of permits to stay and re-entry permits,
- 90-day reporting, including the online option, which became available from April 2015,
- Pension matters (two-track option),

The Committee was also invited by ESCAP HRMS and its Learning Centre to assist in the preparation of a slide presentations on visa and tax issues for UN retirees to be used by UN Headquarters, New York, for inclusion into its globally accessible internet information system.

4.10 Report of the Committee on Charity Activities

The Committee on Charity Activities joined the Thai Returnees of the American Field Service (AFS) Association, Bangkok, in merit making at a school in Nakhon Nayok on 15 November 2014. The contribution of Baht 30,000.00 from the Charity Fund and additional cash received from members of AFICS-T and others were given to the school to support students whose financial support were required as well as to partially provide as monetary presents to students who won the essay contest.

The Committee also provided financial support amounting to Baht 9,000.00 to the Ruth Centre which took care of the poor and elderly persons at slum areas. The financial support was given to the Centre for arranging a social event for elderly persons whereby the Centre would pay respect to them on the occasion of Songkran festival.

On behalf of AFICS-T, the Chairperson of the Committee on Charity Activities and a number of AFICS-T members handed over grocery and sweet items as well as a cashier cheque, amounting to Baht 30,000.00 to Baan Kru Noi for Poor Children, on 12 March 2015.

The donations received from the donors, as of 30 April 2015, was Baht 44,800.00. The Committee and the Executive Board would like to thank the following members for their kind contributions to the Charity Fund and for the above and other activities during the reporting period.
